FINDINGS

On February 22, 2008, the Superintendent of Police filed with the Police Board of the City of Chicago charges against Police Officer Lanell Aubert, Star No. 17543 (hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Respondent"), recommending that the Respondent be discharged from the Chicago Police Department for violating the following Rules of Conduct:

Rule 1: Violation of any law or ordinance.

Rule 2: Any action or conduct which impedes the Department's efforts to achieve its policy and goals or brings discredit upon the Department.

Rule 6: Disobedience of an order or directive, whether written or oral.

Rule 41: Disseminating, releasing, altering, defacing or removing any Department record or information concerning police matters except as provided by Department orders.

The Police Board caused a hearing on these charges against Police Officer Lanell Aubert to be had before Michael G. Berland, Hearing Officer of the Police Board, on July 9 and August 6, 2008.

Following the hearing, the members of the Police Board read and reviewed the record of proceedings and viewed the video-recording of the testimony of the witnesses. Michael G. Berland, Hearing Officer, made an oral report to and conferred with the Police Board before it rendered a decision.

The Police Board of the City of Chicago, as a result of its hearing of the charges, finds and determines that:

- 1. The Respondent was at all times mentioned herein employed as a police officer by the Department of Police of the City of Chicago.
- 2. The charges were filed in writing and a Notice, stating the time, date, and place, when and where a hearing of the charges was to be held, together with a copy of the original charges, were served upon the Respondent more than five (5) days prior to the hearing on the charges.
- 3. The Respondent appeared throughout the hearing and was represented by legal counsel.
- 4. The Respondent's motion to dismiss certain charges is denied for the reasons stated on the record by the Hearing Officer on August 6, 2008.
- 5. The Respondent, Police Officer Lanell Aubert, Star No. 17543, charged herein, is **guilty** of violating, to wit:

Rule 1: Violation of any law or ordinance, in that:

Count 30: On or about March 15, 2006, he used Chicago Police Department database systems to access records regarding Dorian Sydnor for other than official police business, in violation of Department General Order 98-07-04A, entitled "Access to Computer Data, Dissemination and Retention of Computer Data," and/or Department Special Order 98-10, Section III-B-1, entitled "Criminal History Records", thereby disobeying an order or directive, whether written or oral.

Count 31: On or about August 22, 2005, he used Chicago Police Department database systems to access records regarding Kalawole A. Odukoya for other than official police business, in violation of Department General Order 98-07-04A, entitled "Access to Computer Data, Dissemination and Retention of Computer Data," and/or Department Special Order 98-10, Section III-B-1, entitled "Criminal History Records", thereby disobeying an order or directive, whether written or oral.

10. The Respondent, Police Officer Lanell Aubert, Star No. 17543, charged herein, is **guilty** of violating, to wit:

Rule 41: Disseminating, releasing, altering, defacing or removing any Department record or information concerning police matters except as provided by Department orders,

in that:

<u>Count 1</u>: On or about December 10, 2005, he disseminated and/or released the criminal history of Devin Peterson to the U.S. Fugitive Recovery Bureau, an unlicensed bail-bondsman.

<u>Count 2</u>: On or about December 7, 2005, he disseminated and/or released the criminal history of Lorena Stevens to the U.S. Fugitive Recovery Bureau, an unlicensed bail-bondsman.

By reason of the findings of fact and guilt set forth herein, cause exists for the suspension of the Respondent, Police Officer Lanell Aubert, Star No. 17543, from his position as a police officer with the Department of Police, and from the services of the City of Chicago, for a period of one (1) year, from February 26, 2008, to and including February 25, 2009.






